First in the Series, and to introduce February's Black History Month -On Saturday 29th January, African American researchers/genealogists Vicki Jimpson
Fludd & Leigh Fludd-Smith will discuss the History of Blacks in the Hudson Valley; Dutch
and English slavery; enslaved populations here through the years; and how the northern
Black experience and history differs from usual classroom narratives. The researchers'
personal genealogy includes family names such as Whitbeck, Van Alen, Van Ness,
Gardener, Leggett etc. The team will also outline their practices and resources for African
American genealogical research.
